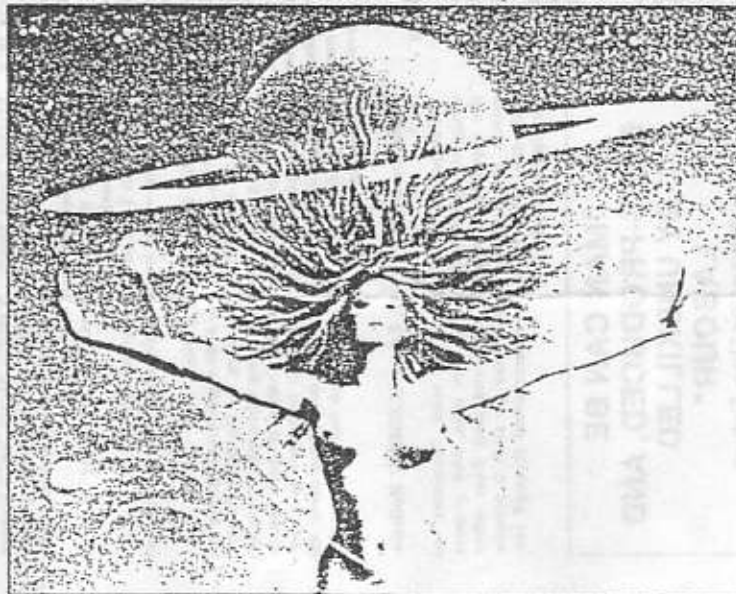
Lots of teenage boys dream about sex. But for eighteen-year-old Jose Inacio Alvaro of Brazil, there were two major differences. First, his dream partner was a female UFO pilot. Second, he met up with some UFOlogists who assured him that this interplanetary liaison had actually occurred.

Alvaro's story began on the evening of March 2, 1978, right after a power failure immersed his home in darkness. Stepping outside to investigate, he was amazed to see a giant UFO. The moving object, hundreds of witnesses later reported, resembled a "gray-colored ball with luminosity around the periphery." Said Alvaro, "It was huge and bright like the sun; I couldn't focus my eyes."

Soon after the UFO vanished, says Alvaro, the electrical power came back on. Too excited to go home, he decided to take a bus to his father's house. And, he claims, after he arrived he looked out the window only to see the UFO again. "I felt dazed," the young man says. "The light seemed to be telling me that I must walk, and I accompanied it to the field."

The next thing Alvaro remembered was waking up in a field about a half mile from his father's house. Already a UFO buff, he'd heard dozens of stories about UFO occupants abducting Earthlings for study, wiping out their memories, then returning them unharmed. To find out whether that had happened to him, he looked up Brazilian UFOlogist Luiz di Rosario Real, who suggested hypnotic regression.

The first session took place less than two weeks later, at the Federal Technical College in Pelotas, Brazil. Under hypnosis Alvaro recalled a sexual encounter with an alien. The



naked seductress, he recalled, had been tall and plump, with light, almond-shaped eyes and long, silvery hair. "Her breasts," he said, "were fuller than the breasts of a female from Earth. Her skin was very light." Alvaro literally quivered with pleasure as he told the story. When he then repeated the tale for a second hypnotist soon after, Real and other local UFOlogists were convinced.

Alvaro insists that though he was emotionally confused after the sighting, the hypnotic regression sessions put his mind to rest. But what actually went on inside his head that evening re-

mains a question for psychologists—investigators have already explained what occurred in the skies.

By some quirk of geography, Brazil is half a world away from Plesetsk, a Soviet spaceport routinely used to launch satellites. After coasting halfway around the earth, Soviet rockets generally fire, pushing the satellites into distinctive, highly elliptic twelve-hour orbits. Moments later, as the exhausted rocket is coasting across the continent, it vents its remaining propellant to prevent any explosions. When these flights occur at twilight, the propellant cloud is backlit by the sun, which has already set for ground observers. Those on the ground see a rapidly moving sphere, its edges brighter than its center because it is really only an expanding shell of gas. At 10:00 P.M. on March 2, 1978, the communications satellite *Molniya 1-39* blasted off from Plesetsk. A little more than an hour later it (and its venting booster) crossed the skies of Brazil. On the ground thousands of observers began freaking out, one worse than most.—JAMES OBERG

were in the vicinity of the firm of Kaepfer, in the suburb of Sindigos Lopes, saw a glowing light over the southern horizon — an enormous glowing star of changing colours." According to the student Silvio Morelli, it "was like one of those shining satellites that you see from time to time" — but with a difference — "it was squinting light".

Testimony in Evidence of José Inácio's Account

On March 19, 1978, Investigator Luiz do Rosário was at the abduction site, looking for traces. With him were Elizabeth Regina G. Real, his daughter (and an amateur photographer), Maria-Regina da Silva, Orlando Costa Silva, and the abductee himself, José Inácio.

After walking some distance, the party came to a spot where, in a hollow, they found on the ground the visible marks of where the body of José Inácio had lain when he was there during the night of March 2nd. The grass had grown quite a lot since, but was still crushed, and the soil beneath it was wet. José Inácio recalled that, when he had got home on the night of the abduction, he had noticed that his trousers were wet and dirty. In an attempt to reconstitute his experience, he lay down again there in the same position that he had been in when he had recovered consciousness, on the very spot where the grass was crushed. And his trousers became dirtied again in precisely the same places. He also remembered that, when he found himself there after the abduction, he was unable to see the lights of the town as he picked himself up. And, in fact, it was now possible to confirm this, the cause being the slope in the terrain there.

José Inácio Seen Lying in the Field in the Early Morning After the Abduction

Sr. Júlio Dias de Campos, stonemason, aged 35, residing at 992 Rua Frontino Vieira, in the suburb of Fragata, revealed to some of his neighbours that, in the early morning of March 3, 1978, he had seen a youth lying, face downward, at the very spot where José Inácio had been. He had in fact even tried to help him to get up. With no explanation, the youth had got to his feet and, reeling to and fro, walked off.

However, most unfortunately, when Luiz do Rosário Real interrogated Júlio Dias de Campos about this, he denied this story. But, in the meantime, the investigator had already secured tape-recorded statements from several people living at 576, Rua Campos Sales in Fragata and, according to these people, Júlio had categorically told them that he had seen "a youth lying in the field" on the early morning of March 3, 1978, and that he was now denying having made this statement because he "is afraid of getting involved".

**Some Further Remarks
The UFO Seen by José Inácio in 1964**

When José Inácio was only four years old, in 1964, his father called him one night to see a strange object passing over in the sky, and the boy arrived just in time to see that the UFO was more or less of a round shape, with "a sort of collar of multicoloured lights spinning around it and flashing intermittently." The sighting lasted but a few seconds, but it was sufficient for them to establish that the UFO, flying on a south-north course, made no sound.

His Mother's Strange Dream

During the night of March 18/19, 1978, his Mother, Dona Iracema Valadão Alvaro, had a strange and curious dream in which an unknown person tapped her on the shoulder and exchanged the following dialogue with her:

— "My congratulations. You are going to be a grandmother!"

— "But I am already a grandmother!"

— "No — but it will be the child of your youngest son."

— "But he hasn't got a wife."

— "Yes — you're going to be a grandmother, but not here in this World, but there, in the other Space!"

"Thinking this all very amusing when she woke up, Dona Iracema recounted the dream to José Inácio next morning. He was *profoundly* impressed by it, seeing that his Mother knew nothing whatsoever about the "task" he had had to fulfil and which had been revealed by the assistants of hypnosis.
